Summer Student Employment

We are now accepting applications for Summer Student Labourers. Duties will include cemetery mowing, ballpark mowing, landfill site clean-up and building maintenance. A valid Driver's Licence is required. Students must be no older than 29 and must be returning to school in the fall.

Applications forms can be picked up at the Municipal Office during office hours and must be returned no later than Friday, May 28th by noon.

Fire Permit Reminder

Fire permits are required for burning effective April 1st. Five day permits will issued for brush and grass. Seasonal Permits (for brush and grass) will be issued ONLY to those individuals who have completed the Fire Management Training Course. You must obtain a permit for your Incinerator or Outdoor Solid Fuel Burning Appliance if they are operational between April 1 and October 31, 2010.

Landfill Reminder

Please be advised that summer hours are in effect. Hours of operation from May 1st to October 31st are: Saturdays and Sundays from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. and Tuesdays and Thursdays from 4 p.m. to 8 p.m. Please be sure to bring your landfill card with you. If you don't have one, stop by the municipal office to get a replacement. Please note that access to the wood pile and scrap metal pile requires the assistance of the attendant.

Building Permits
