We also accept post-dated cheques and e-transfers. If you prefer to pay by cash, please have as close to the correct amount of the billing as possible as no change will be provided.

Landfill

Be advised that we cannot accept hazardous material at our landfill. This includes paint, aerosol cans, oil and antifreeze. The Town of Fort Frances hosts a hazardous waste day in September and items can be taken there for disposal. Please help keep our landfill clean and free from hazardous material by doing your part.

Landfill site access cards are for residents of the Township of La Vallee ONLY! Access can be revoked if the rules are not followed.
